District 5M-10 Can Do Canines Chair

"Thank you for your interest in participating in the Tinnitus Research Study with the Otology research team at the University of Minnesota! This is a research study to examine how tinnitus or 'ringing in the ears' affects brain signals, and how these brain signals can be used to help researchers develop better tools to diagnose people with tinnitus. A research coordinator from our research team will contact you in the near future and provide you with an online eligibility questionnaire, as part of the screening process.

If eligible, there will be a remote consent meeting and a total of three separate appointments: hearing test and neuropsychological questionnaires, magnetoencephalography (MEG) scan appointment, and a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) scan appointment. The MEG machine works like a very sensitive microphone to detect the magnetic activity of brain cells (neurons). The MRI machine works like a camera to record the structure of your brain anatomy. There is no treatment or intervention in this study. There will be no direct benefit to the participant. Two of the appointments will take place on campus, and the MEG appointment will be in St. Paul at United Hospital. Participation in the study is voluntary. Eligible participants will be compensated for their time, and are paid based on completing the three appointments. Total compensation can be up to \$300.

Please note, to reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission, participants are discouraged from bringing visitors to study visits. While on campus, research staff and participants will adhere to University policies and practice social distancing of six feet apart, hand hygiene, and will be required to wear masks at all study visits. We may have longer waiting times.

As openings become available, we will email you a link to our secure online eligibility questionnaire that you can complete at your convenience. Upon completion, you will receive a follow-up email regarding your eligibility with next steps."

Anyone interested in our study can contact our study team through this email to receive additional information."

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## DISTRICT SERVICE PROJECT:

We're asking you to make an easy tied fleece blanket in support of Childhood Cancer. These blankets will be showcased at the convention. After the convention, the blankets will be collected and shared with health-care facilities throughout Northeastern Minnesota and Northwestern Ontario.

If you can use a pair of scissors and tie a knot, you can do this. We had originally planned on doing this project at the convention when it was being planned as an in-person convention. We had to alter our plans to accommodate a virtual convention so are asking members to make their blankets ahead of time and share their projects online at the convention.

Following is a set of written instructions for making these blankets. A group of Dryden Trillium Lions also put together an entertaining video with instructions. You can view that video here <a href="https://youtu.be/oWFOrAko50Q">https://youtu.be/oWFOrAko50Q</a>.

## No Sew Tied Fleece Blanket

You will need 2 pieces of polar fleece, 40" x 60". You can make smaller or larger blankets.



Square off your fleece so they are the exact same size and take off the selvage edges.

With the two pieces laying on top of each other, wrong sides together, cut out the four corners. This is done by cutting a square out of each corner. Depending on how long you want your ties, your square should be either 5" or 6".

You can stabilize the blanket for cutting by putting some pins or masking tape along your 5" or 6" cutting line.



Cut your ties all around the blanket. Ties can be whatever width you like, i.e.  $1 \frac{1}{2}$ , 1" or  $\frac{3}{4}$ ".

The blanket is finished off by then tying the top and bottom ties together in a knot.

You are done!!!

P.S. Making these blankets with a few friends, a beverage (or 2) and some good snacks, makes for a fun project.

## LIONS GIFT OF SIGHT

Two OVNS faculty members were featured at the 2020 EBAA Cornea and Eye Banking Forum. **Joshua Hou, M.D.**, Lions Gift of Sight Medical Director, presented on "Can SARS-CoV-2 be Transmitted through DonorCorneal Tissue? An in vitro Infection Study." Dr. Hou concludes that transmission of COVID-19 in donor ocular tissues is a legitimate concern based on the infection study showing that donor ocular tissues can be infected by SARS-CoV-2 virus. The virus also retains its infectivity under current corneal storage conditions.

**Stephen Kaufman, M.D., Ph.D.**, Lions Gift of Sight Associate Medical Director, is the recipient of the R. Townley Paton Award, and as such gave a lecture on the topic of his choice: "Reflections During Covid-19: My

Important but Little Known Research and our Legacy." Dr. Kaufman's legacy is, indeed, long, and he has contributed valuable work to the areas of corneal preservation media, LASIK interface inflammation, cryopreservation of corneal limbal stem cells, and corneal collagen cross-linking, among others. He is a strong supporter of the International Journal of Eye Banking and community eye banks.

Also awarded to Dr. Kaufman's father in 1983, the R. Townley Paton Award is the EBAA's highest honor for corneal surgeons and is presented annually to an ophthalmologist in recognition of outstanding contributions to the EBAA's development and for exemplifying the precepts of R. Townley Paton, M.D., the father of modern eye banking and the founder of the first United States eye bank. Congratulations to Dr. Kaufman for this honor!

#### **District 5M10 Plastic Recycling Challenge**

#### Lions District 5M10 Newsletter Update December 12, 2020

Lions Clubs in our District are collecting and recycling soft plastic. Seven clubs so far have accepted the challenge to see how much soft plastic they can recycle by the Midwinter Convention. Another campus club is considering taking up the challenge even though students have been disbursed far and wide to their homes to take their classes virtually. The campus clubs deserve a roar from the rest of the clubs in the District to recognize their efforts during the disruption caused by the Covid 19 pandemic.

The amount of plastic clubs have reported recycling as of December 1, 2020:

| Vermillion Bay Lions Club     | 49 lbs         | 1.1 lbs/member    |

These clubs have collected, weighed, and recycled a total of 602 pounds of plastic so far.

What plastic can be recycled, you ask? If your club recycles the most plastic per member by the Mid-Winter Convention, it will receive special recognition and an award from Lions District 5M10.

## SIOUX LOOKOUT LIONS

#### December 2020 Newsletter

The Sioux Lookout Lions Club had our very first virtual induction of 3 new members in November. DG Lion Shirley lit a virtual candle and led the new members through the ceremony. Although they did not get to light their own candles and their sponsors weren't physically there to present them with their Lion's pin, they all enjoyed the ceremony.

Our Storage Wars fundraiser began at the end of June and continued throughout the summer and into the fall. To date, we have raised \$2533 in this on-line auction. Considering this was intended to be a short-term auction of Mandala painted rocks only, with the addition of donations of items from community members, it has turned into a lucrative, ongoing fundraiser.

Our new "Celebration Fundraiser", also known as the "Smile Maker" is up and running and profitable. Lions members worked together to create a series of signs celebrating everything from birthdays to births. The signs, along with personalized age frames, message frames and extra decorations (hearts, stars, pompoms and honk signs) are booked through email by someone wanting to brighten someone else's day. Advertising went out on Sept. 20<sup>th</sup> and within minutes we had our first booking. Our first set up was on Sept. 22<sup>nd</sup> and since that time, we have had 43 bookings, with a total of

\$1645 raised to the end of December, although we are sure to have more bookings. We created stands to allow us to continue into the winter months and we have bookings into February at this point.

For our Lions Week of Service, we held an "On-line Halloween Costume Contest". Donations from the community in the form of gift certificates, as well as local gift certificates purchased by us, were given as prizes. We asked businesses for a \$15 gift certificate donation in return for us purchasing a \$10 gift corticate, which made the outlay ultimately only \$5. Our purpose was two-fold – to purchase and support locally only, as well as to bring in two people to local businesses to spend their gift certificates. We had 4 age categories with 2 prizes within each (scariest and most original), and we also had the best incorporation of a COVID mask into a costume. We had some additional gift certificates that allowed us to do two random draws from all entries as well.

We purchased 30 calendars from the Green Capes Lions which helped them to raise funds for the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides, and allowed us to raise \$300 to be put toward a future donation.

This year for World Diabetes Day, we decided to focus our efforts on an online campaign. Throughout the week, we posted various informative links on our Facebook club page, where our members from our Sioux Lookout community commented and shared their own experiences and successes living with diabetes. Our club also decided to conclude with a symbolic gesture. The blue circle has been the adopted symbol of diabetes awareness and prevention for many years. As a club, we decided to create a collage with either a photo of one of our members or an image of a lion with a blue circle displayed in the corner of the visual with the line "We Are United".

Donations were sent in for our Parade of Green charities. \$250 each to the Canadian Diabetes Association, the Lions Foundation of Manitoba & NWO, the Canadian National Institute for the Blind – North Region and the Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF, as well as \$200 to the Canadian Lions Childhood Cancer Foundation, with \$50 being given previously in DG Lion Shirley's name.

We donated twenty \$25 local grocery gift cards to the Nishnawbe Gamik Friendship Centre to add to their Christmas Hampers that are given out to those with food insecurity in our community.

Merry Christmas and here's hoping 2021 brings us health and some normalcy back into all of our lives!


