## 2017 MD5M Convention Report

## December 1, 2016

## Lions of the North

Christmas Greetings to Lions in 5M10. We look forward to being hosts for the MD5M convention. We are honored to host this convention in our 100<sup>th</sup> year. Thank you for your willingness to volunteer and attend this great event.

The 2017 MD5M Lions Convention will be held at the Sanford Center in Bemidji, MN, on April 21-22-23, 2017. Lions from the Bemidji Lions Club, the First City Lions Club of Bemidji, and Lions Clubs in 5M10 are the hosts for this great event.

Our planning and promotion are having good results:

- Thanks to our promotion efforts, 202 have preregistered. The registration cost is now \$110 until March 1, 2017. The registration costs for the host clubs will be \$100 for the full hospitality book. Registrations from 5M10 are 19; 5 Bemidji Lions have preregistered. We can now do registrations by credit card.
- 2. The convention fund now stands at \$23,881.77, with all bills paid.
- 3. Plans are being made to promote the MD5M Lions Convention at scheduled midwinter conventions in January and February, 2017. Here is the full schedule with the willing Lions speaker volunteers:

You should note two things in particular: (1) a new item regarding having all clubs in MD5M come to the Mall of America next June 3rd with a little red wagon all decorated with your club's name and your city's name, to enter into what we hope will be the world's longest "inside" parade. We hope to set a new world's record in that regard and get into the Guinness Book of World Records; and (2) that we are indeed in active pursuit of someone with Ad Agency experience to help us enhance our entire presence in the Mall next June.

As part of our Mall of America event, we will focus on the 4 areas of hunger, environment, youth and vision. Accompanying this you will see the appeal from 2<sup>nd</sup> Harvest Food Shelf who we are partnering with for this event. I hope all clubs will consider participating in this effort.

Lion Dave Moen will have the MD5M Eyeglass Recycling Center trailer on site at the Mall into which we can place donations of eyeglasses. Dennis Kelly has confirmed that the \$100,000 grant from the MN Vision Foundation has already been confirmed and received for the Kids Sight activity. Now, all we need is the matching grant from LCI.

The plan for having Lions present at the Mall to assemble Summer Kids Paks is being addressed, according to Chair Cheryl Thompson. She said we'll need stickers printed to put on the paks.

We have plans for demonstrating the Leos Projects. Information is needed so that we can tell the staff at the MOA exactly what we plan on having going on at the Mall and what tables and chairs will be needed, including any electricity.

I will plan to have a table at the midwinter with Centennial Celebration material on display.
