As we do this reflection I hope that we also are completing one of our Lions Clubs. Reflect and revitalize...remember why we are Lions and where this club of ours wants to be!


Look at where we were in 1917...all those goals achieved since then...the people helped...the new members and clubs and look where we are now! Centennial...100 years of we serve.

Currently he serves as GLT Area "D" Coordinator as well as the Sponsorship Chairperson for the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum.

View From the Lighthouse: A Success Story

Maris expected to spend his retirement playing golf and fishing. But when he started to lose his vision due to macular degeneration he wasn't sure what to expect. Reading had become difficult. His eye care doctor referred him to the Lighthouse Center for Vision Loss for low vision services.

Laura, a Low Vision Occupational Therapist with the Lighthouse's Safe at Home with Vision Loss program visited him. She conducted a full lighting assessment, testing Maris' vision under a variety of light conditions. With the right lighting and magnifier, Maris was excited to find he can still read recipes from his favorite cook book.

Laura also helped Maris adjust to his vision loss by fitting him with tinted sun-glasses. Glare both indoors and out had been a problem since his vision loss and the right colored shades made a big difference. Macular degeneration causes the loss of straight-ahead vision, making it difficult to recognize faces.

With training, Maris learned to use his remaining peripheral vision to look at faces. After practicing this new skill, he exclaimed to his wife, "I can see your face! I'm talking to you and I can see your face," with a big smile.

Excited about being able to continue doing what's important to him, Maris is happy to learn new ways of doing tasks. He's working to finish his basement and is putting to use the adaptive skills he's learned. "It takes patience, but I have a lot of that from being a dentist for many years."

The Lighthouse Center for Vision Loss serves 1,500 individuals each year in all stages of vision loss. Welcome to Your Leader Dogs for the Blind

The 77-year partnership between Lions and Leader Dogs for the Blind (LDB) started with "\$400 and a hatful of ideas." Together we've assisted people who are blind and Deaf-Blind in all 50 U.S. states and many other countries. LION Magazine listed LDB as one of their "10 Brilliant Breakthroughs in Service." LDB is your community's resource with all of our programs provided free of charge.

Leader Dog empowers people who are blind with the skills needed for independent daily travel by offering:

Guide Dog Training

Leader Dog provides highly-trained, qualified guide dogs to people who are legally blind, 16 years or older, with basic orientation and mobility skills, and can physically and mentally use and care for a dog in the intended manner.

In 1991 LDB began providing guide dogs to people who are both hearing and visually impaired.

Accelerated Orientation & Mobility Training (commonly known as white cane training)

This residential program pairs clients and instructors 1-to-1 to quickly help clients obtain the basic orientation and mobility skills needed to travel safely with a cane. About 50% of these clients return to train with a Leader Dog.

GPS Training

Like your cars' GPS, this hand-held technology allows clients to know where they are, what direction they are traveling and what businesses are nearby. Previously, clients needed to rely on others for this information. All guide dog clients from the U.S. and Canada receive this device free of charge.

Summer Experience Camp

A unique summer camp for teens ages 16 and 17 who are legally blind combines summer fun with an introduction to guide dogs, leadership training and the opportunity to spend time with peers who are facing similar challenges.

Your clubs' support has enabled LDB to provide Leader Dog's to over 15,000 people who live in all of our communities.

We thank Lion Bob Howe for organizing the Salvation Army volunteer activities again this year.




