All new members must be entered into MYLCI before 30 June in order for your club to be credited and eligible. If your club is eligible for CSC awards, the information must be entered in MYLCI and flagged as CSC projects, including legacy projects.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate our newest club in Chisholm, MN. Twenty-five new lions formed a club, have projects and fundraisers pending and are expecting to really connect with their community. They have a charter celebration night scheduled for Thursday, June 1st at 6pm in Jim's Café (maybe outside) on the main street in Chisholm. The theme is a luau and everyone is invited, including their entire community of Chisholm. RSVP by May 20th is a must to give us time to plan enough food. Club Business Cards and Brochures – Event Takeaways!

Business Cards

A professional business card reflects your club's service mission and provides current contact information. They are often the first item community business people, organizations and potential members receive from us, so it's a first opportunity to make a strong, positive impression. There are a number of inexpensive online companies that print customized cards. Another idea would be to partner with a printing company in your area. Often they offer discounts to nonprofit groups.

Four Basic Design Tips:

- · Keep it simple
- Keep to the standard business card size
- Carefully choose the information to appear on your card
- Keep the back blank or use it for non-critical information.

Think about how you have used other people's business cards. Information should be a positive reflection on our club, and mirror our well-defined Lions brand identity.

Brochures

Brochures are indispensable to most organizations and can be persuasive when they're used effectively. Often we don't use brochures as part of our overall club marketing strategy because of the cost. By using the templates provided by Lions Clubs International and incorporating a personalized design, brochures are one of the least expensive options we have when developing a new member or awareness campaign, negotiating partnerships or offering a "takeaway" informational piece at various events.

Brochures can work and are one of the best ways to uniquely describe our clubs, our mission and our service to the community. Brochures allow us to offer just enough information for interested people to ask for more and can be the cornerstone of club public relations/marketing strategies.

In summary, basic marketing still includes printed brochures and business cards. They can be instrumental in raising awareness and growing membership when they are properly designed and the right strategies and techniques are used.

Shown below is an example of the Duluth Lions Club brochure and business card. The club used the LCI templates for branding purposes and customized the brochure cover and message inside.

Mission Statement

The Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation, Inc. (MLDF) is dedicated to improving the quality of life for people with diabetes by funding research to cure diabetes, providing education and sponsoring preventive health activities.

MLDF Diabetes Research Update Recap

Despite the tempting spring weather, more than 100 Minnesota Lions and their guests came to the University of Minnesota Twin Cities campus for the Eight Annual Lions Diabetes Research Update. This year, Lions enjoyed boxed lunches and catching up with one another in the McNamara Alumni Center.

The program formally began at 11:30 am with remarks from Chairperson, Lion Judy Loken. Judy formally presented a \$75,000 check to this year's research grant recipients: Dr. Bernard Herring for his work towards developing a vaccine to prevent the body from rejecting transplanted pig islet cells; Dr. Brian Fife for his work on blocking the immune pathway in order to prevent the immune system from attacking islet cells; and to Dr. David Bernlohr for his research on the role of calcium in insulin to develop a new drug for the treatment of type 2 diabetes. Lion Judy also presented a \$500,000 check as a symbol of the final payment on the Lions half million pledge for the Minnesota Lions Islet Imaging Lab to Dr. Michael Garwood.

Judy also presented two Dream Catcher Awards to ward to Bonnie Schirlinger and Thomas Johansen for their work as serving as the faces of our foundation. Lion Judy then presented the new informational video about the Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation entitled *Catch the Dream: Living Without Diabetes* which features Bonnie and Thomas. During the research update section of the program, the Lions were able to learn more about the research projects currently receiving funding.

*First to present was Dr. Herring, who provided a general overview of diabetes including the difference between type 1 and type 2. In type 1 the body can no longer produce insulin because the insulin producing islet cells in the pancreas have been destroyed. In type 2, the body becomes insulin resistant. Dr. Herring, whose research is focused on type 1 diabetes, has had much success reversing type 1 diabetes with the transplantation of pig islets into monkeys. Monkeys receiving transplanted cells demonstrate a long-term diabetes reversal and extended survival rates. Dr. Herring's next goal is to create a vaccine that prevents the body from rejecting these transplanted islets. These vaccines remove, with the precision of a laser, the tiny part of the immune system that is activated by foreign antigens from the pig donor. When fully successful, the vaccines will eliminate the need for chronic immunosuppression otherwise required to prevent rejection of transplanted islets. Dr. Herring concluded with," Science is no longer limiting us. It is a very exciting time in diabetes research."

Next to present was Dr. Fife, an immunologist, whose work is focused on targeting the immune cells that cause type 1 diabetes. In order to cure type 1 diabetes, we must identify, remove or control the

Tcells that are inadvertently killing the insulin producing islet cells. With funding from the Lions, Dr. Fife has developed a way to identify, track and interrogate these T cells in both mouse models and humans. Considered as Phase One of the project, Dr. Fife's team is now generating novel antibodies that can limit these T cells and prevent them from becoming activated in the first place. If the T cells are blocked and cannot from become activated, beta cells will not get destroyed and thus neutralize the T cells causing diabetes.

Dr. Paul Wang, an MD and PhD candidate and advisee of Dr. Michael Garwood of the Center for Magnetic Resonance Research, spoke next about the research at the Minnesota Lions Islet Imaging Center. Dr. Garwood, Paul and others are working on a cure for type 1 diabetes by implanting a bioartificial pancreas, which they created, into a person's forearm. This bioartifical pancreas, after being implanted, replaces and restores the function that the person's own islet cells that have been destoyed due to type 1 diabetes, thus curing their disease. Supplemental oxygen is critical for implanted islet survival inside a bio-artificial pancreas. They have developed an oxygen delivery system for use with rats and are in the process of developing a miniaturized oxygen delivery device for human use.

Last to present, was Dr. Bernlohr, who spoke about his research on the role of calcium in insulin as a new drug for the treatment of type 2 diabetes. Bernlohr's lab is using the newly discovered SERCA activator as a new drug for the treatment of type 2 diabetes. SERCA is a calcium pump and Dr. Berhnlohr has discovered that calcium is misregulated in the context of diabetes. Using obese insulin resistant mice, the SERCA activator drug (CDN1163) has successfully lowered cytoplasmic calcium in fat cells which protects those cells from dying, thereby improving their metabolism. This has the effect of increasing insulin action and reducing insulin resistance. All of the researchers expressed their gratitude to the Lions for their critical support that has made a tremendous difference in the lives of so many.

LCI Forward

To all Lions who are attending the LCI Convention in Chicago – There is a Strides Diabetes Awareness Walk hope you can attend. Also visit with the LCI Health Coordinators – Let them know how important the support from LCI is to us, so we can promote diabetes education in our communities.

The 2017 MD5M Lions Convention was held at the Sanford Center in Bemidji, MN, on April 21-22-23, 2017. Lions from the Bemidji Lions Club, the First City Lions Club of Bemidji, and the Lions Clubs of 5M10 were the hosts for this great event.

Thank you to the past Council of Governors for giving the Lions of 5M10 the opportunity to host the MD5M Convention this year. We were honored to host this celebration in LCI's 100th year. We thank all Lions of MD5M for attending and volunteering.

Congratulations to the Bemidji Convention Committee on the planning and delivery of a very successful MD5M Convention. Also, congratulations to the Bemidji Lions and First City of Bemidji Lions for their hospitality and work "behind the scenes". Also, thank you to the Sanford Center and staff for the excellent support given to the committee throughout the implementation process.

The top ten reasons for the convention's huge success include:

- 1) The Sanford Center, with easy access to meeting rooms and the arena;
- 2) The Hotels;
- The Friday night entertainment as noted by the large number of Lions and guests in attendance right up to the end;

the BHS String Quartet entertainment, the Service of Remembrance, the excellent programs and convention booklet done through Arrow Printing, the Lions of the North pins, pens and notebooks, the shuttle bus service between the hotels and Sanford Center, the excellent cooperation between the convention committee with the City of Bemidji and Visit Bemidji, the Opening Ceremonies with the BHS Color Guard and welcome by the Bemidji Mayor, the informative table displays in the hallway, the excellent spring weather, plenty of fun and laughter, and the great reunion of Lions friends and supporters.

The 98th Annual MD5M Convention will show a profit.

Total registrations were 602, with full hospitality books at 455.

The Zero K Walk/Run for Diabetes had 284 participants, which raised over \$6000 for the foundations in Minnesota and Canada. Not bad for a first year!

Total Income for the convention was \$83,281.50; the expenses (so far) were \$74,575.30.

The 99th MD5M Convention will be April 13-15, 2018, in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada. The Winnipeg Committee already has over 200 Lions registered.

MD5M Council of Governors Meeting



The MD5M Council of Governors met in Minneapolis MN on Saturday, March 11, 2017 and in Bemidji MN on Friday, April 21, 2017. We will address **March's meeting** first- Council Chair Todd Neumann reminded us of the "Community Peace Project Challenge". District 5M4 had a community discussion with police officers. Can Do Canines are in need of more funding because of a 12% increase in their graduation of more dogs. GMT announced that in 8 months, 5 new clubs have formed, 6 districts are in the plus, 5M5 is at +87, 5M3 +12. Texas membership is at 24,938 with a loss of -606; MD5M- 21,482 with a loss of -31; California 20,531 with a growth of +444.

There is a new Mac Degeneration/Glaucoma- Age related website: MNEYELINK.org They are in need of donations for there is a waiting list for supplies. 90-92 cents of every \$1.00 donated goes for supplies. Link on the website for information. It was M/S/P to allow them to solicit donations from Lions Clubs.

The Redwing Lions Club is hosting a huge eye glass collection on June 25th. They would like to collect over 100,000 pairs of glasses so they are asking that clubs bring their glasses to the MD5M Convention in April or to Redwing on June 25.

Youth Exchange has added Foundation in their name. Leo's are celebrating 60 years since they formed in 1957 and will celebrating at the USA/Canada Leos Leadership Forum in NY August 2-6.

MD5M- COG- Bemidji MN-

Lions Clubs International is looking to make a name change by removing Clubs from their title. They will be known as Lions International. This will be voted on at International Convention.

PID Brian Sheehan announced that he is seeking 3rd International Vice President position in Las Vegas. Nominations and Demonstrations were held. Voting was held by ballot with Lion Brian receiving 276 votes. PID Brian will not throw his hat into the ring for office until after the Chicago Convention so no endorsement for Lion Brian will be done at this International Convention. PID Brian will need help at the Las Vegas convention to win the vote.

International Convention hosting sites after this year will be: 2018- Las Vegas, 2019- Milan Italy, 2020- Singapore, 2021- Montreal Quebec, 2022- New Delhi India, 2023- Boston MA, 2024- Melbourne Australia. There has been an endorsement to make International Directors a 3 year commitment and not 2 year.

PDG Bill Michl will be running around Lake Superior this summer. The slogan of 2 million steps for 2 million dollars for LCIF. Due to circumstances, the MOA Centennial Celebration on June 3 has been postponed to Saturday, October 7 at the MOA. More details to come.

Can Do Canines Woofaroo will be held on September 16. Leadership Institute had 62 graduates. Lion Bert Nelson, LCIF Chair is donating \$100.00 to LCIF for every district who has 100% donations from their Lions Clubs. Minnesota Lions vision Foundation is building a new 4 story research building. Lions have the naming rights to this building and will need \$21 million donation to this project.

SUCCESS STORY | Jim




INDEPENDENCE THROUGH ADAPTIVE SKILLS

Jim is an 81-year old Cloquet resident with very low vision due to macular degeneration. He lives with his wife in their own one-story home. Jim also has Parkinson's disease, and his wife has some health and mobility issues as well. It is very important to both of them to continue living in their own home.

Jim is a long-time participant in the Lighthouse Low Vision Support Group, but in 2012, he admitted he was feeling very sad about his vision loss. Through the Lighthouse's Safe at Home with Vision Loss program, he gained the additional training and skills he needed to continue living with his wife in their home.

Ann, an occupational therapist with the Lighthouse, came to Jim's home and talked with him about all that is possible despite vision loss. She showed him that by learning new ways of doing everyday tasks, he could still do things that are important to him.

Ann assessed his home environment for safety and made recommendations on adapting some appliances. She showed Jim that he can continue to cook safely by applying "bump dots" to the controls on the stove and outdoor barbeque to indicate whether a burner is off or not. He also learned how to safely cut the bread he makes from scratch and how to use a large print address book to keep track of the addresses for friends and family.

More recently, Jim's wife mobility began to decline. He now needs to do more around the house in order to keep them both safe at home. In the fall of 2014, another Lighthouse instructor, Nancy, went to see Jim. Nancy is dually certified as both a vision rehabilitation therapist and an orientation and mobility instructor. She worked with Jim to practice adaptive ways of cooking and cleaning, and also to be able to use a white support cane to walk safely around his home, grocery store and neighborhood. Nancy also taught him how to use a monocular device to be able to read street signs when walking or signs in the grocery store.

Today, Jim and his wife continue to live safely and independently in their own home. His confidence has grown tremendously and he is no longer so sad about his vision loss. To learn more, contact the Lighthouse Center for Vision Loss or visit lcfvl.org.


Voyageur Lions
