It has been a great year!!! I am extremely proud of everything the District accomplished this year. For the last time, I am writing an article as your district governor. Throughout the District we have accomplished great things this year! For the first time in many years the District surpassed 1300 members. For the first time in many years we chartered two new clubs and a LEO club. We have the best retention of members in the multiple district. We surpassed 200 attendees at our midwinter with approximately 40 of them first time attendees. We had over 600 registered attendees at the multiple district convention in Bemidji. Thirteen clubs qualified for and received club excellence awards last year. Twenty are on track to do that this year. Reporting of membership, officers and activities on MYLCI has more than doubled this year over last year. We will far exceed more than 20,000 hours of service to our communities if we report all that we do. Those are great accomplishments that everyone in the district contributed their efforts to achieve. We also improved communications between the clubs, the zone chairs, and the DG. Numerous training opportunities were realized at different levels of

the district. We also have the next three midwinter locations identified. Every club improved in at least on area, many in several areas!

However, we cannot rest on our laurels. Now is the normal time that leadership in the clubs and the district must focus our efforts on planning to retain our new members, advertise our summer projects to our communities, finish the yearly paperwork, and recognize individual members within our clubs for their hard work. The accomplishments of this past year were the results of several years of hard work, training, and working together with a common goal. Recognize that our clubs have to change with the times. Lions clubs today are much more than a businessman's club. We are here to serve our communities with every member we have. Look at our new clubs. I challenge any club to keep up with our newest LEO club in Duluth.

Our new Chisholm club reflects that change. In just three days we recruited 25 new members for the new club. The Oldest member is over 70 and the youngest member is 22. They represent every aspect of their community. Their charter night was a true celebration with a luau theme, a great speaker, and a lot of fun. Nine different clubs from throughout the district, including from Canada, attended their celebration. If we can do it in Chisholm we can do it anywhere in the District one club at a time.

As I move from being the DG to being a past DG, I wish to convey my heartfelt thanks to everyone who worked so hard and diligently to support me this past year. I ask that you give DGE Mark the

unwavering support that you accorded me as I, with your help, directed and improved District 5M10. It wasn't always popular with everyone. It was certainly not business as usual in many cases, but it reflected changes that we must all embrace if we intend to move into the future. Learn to use technology to lessen our geographical and political

differences. Recognize that new leaders have new ideas and if we don't let them lead, they will find other outlets for their ideas and energy.

Remember, "If we keep doing the same thing the same way we will always be in the same place."

Past district governor to run around Lake Superior By Duane Hicks Fort Frances Times



By all estimates, it takes 2.1 million steps to travel by foot around the perimeter of Lake Superior. Not a task for the faint-hearted.

But Bill Michl, past district governor for Lions District 5M10, is stepping up to the challenge to make the 1,985-km (1,300-mile) trek in 82 days this summer.

The "Making Superior Lions Run" will begin July 8 and take until Sept. 28 to raise awareness—and funds—for the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF).

The 62-year-old member of the Fort Frances Voyageur Lions Club, who's been running for the past 14 years, conceived the idea for the run.

"I knew the Lions' 100th anniversary was coming up and I thought, 'I'll do something really big personally because I think Lions is the best charity in the world," he remarked.

"They help everybody," he noted. "They don't have government or religious backing—they just go and help.

"In my personal life, I like to help everybody that needs it, and I just thought to myself, 'What can I do that would stand out?"

Michl considered running from one end of Ontario to the other but then considered that he belongs to District 5M10, which includes Northwestern Ontario, Minnesota, and Manitoba.

"What's more international than the Great Lakes?" he reasoned.

"I know I couldn't run around all five of them, but I thought I'd start with the big one and see what happens," he chuckled.

As far as he knows, Michl will be the only runner making the entire trek around Lake Superior.

But he's hoping to get Lions Clubs along the route to plan events or otherwise recognize the "Making Superior Lions Run" as he passes through.

Michl also expects some fellow runners to join him for a couple of miles, but added it would not be a good idea for large groups of people to run along with him because it becomes a safety issue.

As well, he has asked Lions from clubs in the Lake Superior area to volunteer to drive a support vehicle and accompany him.

Michl noted he's been getting support from Lions clubs in Thunder Bay, as well as in Wisconsin and Michigan.

"I think it will all fall in place by the time I'm ready to leave," he remarked.

Training challenge

While Michl has participated in many runs and marathons over the years, he said this is his most ambitious by far.

"My longest run to date was the hospital run I did about 10 years ago from Rainy River to Fort," he recalled.

"That's the longest one-day run I've ever done." Michl's 60-mile "Run for the Scan"—more than the equivalent of two full marathons—was held to kick off the "Care Close to Home 2: Just Imagine" campaign to raise \$1.5 million locally for a CT scanner at La Verendrye Hospital in Fort Frances. In order to prepare for this much greater challenge, Michl has refrained from running competitively and instead focused strictly on training.

"I've been structuring my training more or less to this long run, increasing mileage and stuff like that," he explained.

"My normal running routine was four days a week—Monday, speed run; Tuesday, hill run; take a day off; then a speed run; take a day off; then a long slow run on a Saturday," he noted.

"Then as I got closer to this date, I've started running every day because when I do run around Lake Superior, I'll be running every day," said Michl.

"So I started with something I could handle—six or seven miles a day—and am gradually working my way up to 12-13 miles a day."

Michl said he will be striving to run 15 miles a day once he finally runs in July, adding his aim is to train without getting any injuries.

Every day, the LCIF supports the efforts of Lions around the world to improve their communities, noted Michl. Since being founded in 1968, it has given out more than \$1 billion (U.S.) in grants, whether they were for tsunami, flood, or hurricane relief, or programs to eradicate measles and "river blindness" in Third World countries.

"Even when our little town was flooding out here a few years ago, we were on standby," said Michl, adding if anybody had to be evacuated, the LCIF would have issued cheques to help evacuees.

"It's something that's close to my heart, the way they work," he stressed. "That's why I do it." While Michl is not collecting pledges personally, he is asking the public to donate to the LCIF in the name of his run.

CNIB Eye Van's 45th Anniversary in 2017

"On the occasion of the CNIB Eye Van's 45th anniversary in 2017, the Canadian National Institute for the Blind would like to thank Lions Clubs for your outstanding dedication! The CNIB Eye Van has been delivering services throughout Northern Ontario since 1972 and Lions are our lifeline in these remote communities. You (Lions) are an extension of the CNIB team."

5M10 Lions and CNIB Power Point Presentation

The CNIB's Ontario Medical Mobile Eye Care Clinic, also known as, the CNIB Eye Van, a fully-equipped, medical eye care clinic on wheels has embarked on its 2017 tour across Northern Ontario.

Each year from March to November, a group of 25-30 participating ophthalmologists, assisted by two CNIB ophthalmic assistants, carry out vision screening, treat eye conditions and perform minor surgery in remote northern Ontario communities where services are not available. The unique and innovative Medical Mobile Eye Care Unit is an integral part of the Prevention of Blindness program for both CNIB and the Ontario Medical Association.

The Eye Van is a custom-made transport truck and 48 foot trailer including reception and waiting areas, a vision screening area, and a doctor's examination room. Special features include a reinforced floor and hydraulic leveling system that allows for minor surgery to be performed on site, including a state-of-the-art SLT laser for the treatment of glaucoma.

Each year, the Eye Van travels more than 6,000 km to 30 communities, examining more than 5,000 patients. This service provides for an early diagnosis of eye conditions that could lead to blindness if left untreated.

Lions Clubs in 5M10 have been very supportive of the work of the Eye Van assisting in a number of ways including managing appointments, assisting with media releases, welcoming/feeding eye van staff (blue berry pie in Ignace is a favourite), and providing financial assistance. GREAT WORK 5M10 LIONS!

DIABETESCANADA

Diabetes Canada administers the Charles H. Best Research Fund to support research that will enhance our understanding of diabetes and its prevention, treatment and management.

Diabetes Canada is proud to be a leading supporter of diabetes research in Canada. Since 1975 and the establishment of the Charles H. Best Research Fund – named for insulin co-discoverer and Diabetes Canada co-founder Dr. Charles H. Best – Diabetes Canada has awarded more than \$100 million in research grants to scientists who have dedicated themselves to the fight against diabetes.

Since Banting and Best's discovery of insulin in 1921, the scope of diabetes research in Canada has been vast and the numerous studies both varied and unique. With topics ranging from insulin sensitivity of muscle tissue, to the role of cholesterol in the development of type 2 diabetes, to the effect of eating habits on the risk of gestational diabetes, to the role of ACE2 in diabetes-related kidney injury, there have been huge strides and key advances in mapping and understanding the physiology, biochemistry and genetics of diabetes.

Diabetes Canada understands that funding of diabetes research is a crucial step in providing these advances. This is why we choose, each year, to fund Canada's most renowned scientists and clinicians in their quest for new and innovative developments in the prevention, treatment and management of diabetes. Although the research is diverse in its scope, covering a broad range of specialties, the objectives of every study and researcher remain the same – to improve the quality of life of people living with diabetes and to find a cure.

This year's researchers continue the tradition of innovation and discovery with studies covering an array of topics, including: biology, problems with insulin, prevention and management, obesity, complications (both microvascular and macrovascular), special populations and new therapies.

Operating grants are held by independent researchers who can receive funding for up to three years, per grant. Grant holders must have a doctoral degree (MD, PhD, DSc, DDS, PharmD, DVM or equivalent) and an independent faculty position with institutional support at a university or research institution in Canada.

Personnel awards fall into four categories: Clinician Scientist Awards, Scholar Awards, Post-Doctoral Fellowship Awards and Doctoral Student Research Awards. Personnel awards are intended to further the development and training of promising young researchers in the Canadian diabetes research community. Eligibility requirements vary based on the type of award. Awards must be held at Canadian institutions with the exception of Post-Doctoral Fellowships. If there is compelling scientific justification, Canadian citizens and permanent residents may apply for Post-Doctoral Fellowships to be held outside Canada. It is the intent that these promising young researchers will return to Canada to continue their careers.



Roar for Hearing Donates \$17,000 to the Lions MD5M Hearing Foundation, Canadian Division – Hearing Committee

The Roar for Hearing, a fundraiser that takes place annually in Austin, Manitoba (5M13 District) has generously raised \$17,000 for the Hearing Committee over the past three years. A cheque in the amount of \$6,800 was presented at the Hearing Committee Meeting on June 2nd by two Lion Roar for Hearing Committee members, Lions Don Makinson and Bev McCabe, to Lion Wendy Wiedenhoeft, chair of the Hearing Committee. Also on hand to accept the donation were committee members, Lions Lloyd McCabe and Helmut Neufeld. The monies will be used to initiate the Lions Children's Loaner Hearing Aid program that will see loaner hearing aids provided to hearing clinics across Manitoba for the use of infants and children who are newly diagnosed with hearing loss and are waiting for their hearing aid to arrive or who have hearing aids that are being repaired. The use of loaner hearing aids will ensure that children do not have to go without hearing aids at this important time in their language and cognitive development. Investigation will now be taking place by the committee to see if this project should be expanded into the 5M10 District in Ontario.

This year's Roar for Hearing will be their 4th Annual Poker Derby and will take place at the Austin Community Hall in Austin, Manitoba on Saturday, September 9th. Camping facilities are available. Events include the following:

Dryden Trillium Lions Club – #53070 - Activity Report for May, 2017

- Happy 25th Birthday Trillium Lions! Dryden Trillium Lions Club was incorporated on May 11, 1992. Our May general meeting fell on the exact date of our incorporation, May 11th, so we had a birthday party! We chose to celebrate a second time by hosting "Dining in the Dark" on May 27th to benefit the CNIB. See below for details on Dining in the Dark.
- During May \$110.00 was collected from members at our general meeting and \$57.00 was spent to purchase 20 lbs. of ground beef that will feed 80 clients of the Dryden Food Bank.
- Meals on Wheels were delivered on May 6 & 7, 2017 by 2 Lions to 11 clients.
- Our community spring clean-up, postponed by snow in April, resulted in 14 Lion hours by 10 Lions who cleaned 6 different areas of our community.
- Four (4) Trillium Lions have been trained on the SPOT vision camera. An additional 3 members are interested. Testing, organized by Dryden Lions Club, is confirmed at the Dryden Native Friendship Centre on June 15 and at Aboriginal Day on June 21.
- "Dining in the Dark", a celebration of our club's 25th birthday and fundraiser for CNIB (Canadian National Institute for the Blind), held on May 27, 2017, was a great success! Attendees first encountered three "sensory stations" created to experience touch, smell and hearing without seeing the source. The most popular station had participants using only touch to identify many different items ranging from household tools to items of clothing. The second station challenged participants to identify the contents of several different containers using only their sense of smell. The third station tested hearing to identify several sounds. Could you identify the sound of popcorn popping or a snow machine coming to a halt? Guests then donned eye masks provided by CNIB to enter the dimly-lit auditorium, guided to their seats by Trillium Lions members and volunteers, to dine on 4 different desserts without being able to see what

was placed before them. Participants were told the location of their eating utensils, napkin, water glass and dinner plate containing desserts placed at 3, 6, 9 and 12 o'clock. There was much discussion and guessing amid laughter as to what was being consumed, especially once masks were taken off. A fun but serious experience that gave participants much to think about. Lion Wendy Wiedenhoeft gave a thought-provoking talk about her involvement with CNIB and the support and assistance available to individuals with vision loss. Wendy is a board member for the CNIB Northern Regional as well as CNIB Chair for the Lions 5M10 District that encompasses NW Ontario and NE Minnesota.
