MD5M Council of Governors Meeting



The MD5M Council of Governors met at the Kelly Inn in St. Cloud MN on Saturday, July 22, 2017. At the Political Liaison Meeting PID Brian Sheehan discussed his run for International President next year in Las Vegas. Lion Brian <u>will not run without the approval of Lions</u> <u>Clubs International.</u> Their decision will be made by the end of August, 2107. If the campaign happens, we are hoping for 100 members from every District in MD5M in Las Vegas to show support for Lion Brian. Early Registration cut off is January 12, 2018. Watch your District Newsletters for registrations. The Campaign Committee is working with Sun Country on chartered flights from Minnesota to Las Vegas so watch for details. Lion Brian will be quite busy with his campaign in the upcoming months so if you need to contact him for any reason, please contact Lion Bert Nelson. The Sheehan Golf Tourney in Kimball MN on July 21 had 16 sponsors and 160 golfers. Thanks to all who contributed.

The Gavel was passed from Immediate Past Council Chair Todd Neumann to Council Chair Dennis Heinen. Six Districts in MD5M had total Lions Clubs donations to LCIF. Those Districts with 100% were 5M1, 5M2, 5M3, 5M4, 5M6 and 5M8. 86.5% of MD5M Lions Clubs participated in contributing to LCIF with a total donation of \$316,546.00. MD5M placed 2nd in contributions to LCIF just behind California.

The Council of Governors gave their okay to allow the Faribault Lions to contact all Lions Clubs in MD5M for donations to support their purchase of Braille & Talking Book fund, and the Vision Honduras to ask for funding in their mission trips to the mountains in Honduras. Lions Club Presidents be on the lookout for these requests in your inbox. All Lions Clubs need to contact their State Representative (in MN) on the Charitable Gambling taxes before their vote in September/October which gives 50% of gambling money to the state of MN.

There were over 30,000 Lions at the Chicago International Convention with 23,000 participating in the International Parade. There is a new Zone Chair Training online through LCI along with a new Officer Ebook. Diabetes Service patch for club activities that are reported on the Club Activity Reports through MyLCI so be sure your Club Secretary is turning in their reports.

A gathering will be at the MN State Capitol on Tuesday, October 10th for the White Cane Safety Awareness Day. There will be NO event at the MOA in October as planned for the 100th Anniversary Celebration. Another event is being planned and details will come at a later date.

Can Do Canines have had a large number of puppies born recently and are looking for puppy raisers. If you hear the calling to raise a puppy please contact Can Do Canines.

The Diabetes Foundation will be running their calendar fundraising campaign this year. Please watch for details on purchasing your calendar days and buying the calendars. Their informational Diabetes Day which is held at various Wal-Marts throughout the Multiple is being planned.

PDG Bill & PDG Donna Landwehr are now New Club Chairs for MD5M. They are requesting every District start working on achieving 2 new clubs this year 2017-2018. Contact them for help in your district to reach this goal.

The MD5M Convention will be in Winnipeg on April 13-15th. Registrations will be in your District Newsletters and on all websites: District and Multiple. Remember that you will need a passport to cross the border or an enhanced driver's license or a picture ID with a birth certificate. We are hoping the have 1st International Vice President Gudrun Bjort Yngvadottir as our visiting International Guest. She will be the first woman to serve as a Lions International President 2018-2019.

An article on the 100th International Lions Convention along with pictures was sent to each district newsletter. A Multiple PR training was held at the Multiple Convention in Bemidji. We had 8 districts represented at this meeting. The District Public Relations chairs worked on revamping their District Job Description so all District

Public Relations Chairs have a basic core to work with. What is needed in each individual district beyond the core plan is up to the current District Governor. Attached to this report is a copy of the description decided upon by the group. There was also a Newsletter round table discussion on their problems, what works, what doesn't work, how to make changes to make things work better.

I have been in contact with all District Public Relation Chairs and Newsletter Chairs via email. If they have any questions or need assistance in these areas, they should not hesitate to contact me.

I feel very strongly about your District developing a Public Relations Kit, maybe even 2 depending on the size of your district, that contains the informational fliers from the other cabinet chairs areas. It should also contain the free give away's from the Vision Foundation. A list is attached to this report what can be used as the base for building your kit. Purchasing a tote on wheels or in my district I purchased a large square cooler on wheels with a luggage extension handle worked great! Be sure to pick up a few plastic holders to put some of the fliers in on your table (any office supply has them). I have been in charge of the 5M3 Kit to keep it up to date and the storage of it until a club requests to use this kit for a Lions event, Sportsman's Show, County Fair, etc. I am hoping your PR person is willing to take charge of this and keep it up to date. Has your district purchased a District banner?

The one we have is 4 X 6. If your district has a supplier for this, I highly encourage you to make this purchase along with 3M hooks to display this at events with the kit. If you are in need of a supplier that works well with Lions I recommend Western Printing in Marshall MN.507-537-1577

The MD5M Centennial Public Relations Contest has been sent to all district newsletters & websites. I have been in email contact with many of the District Public Relations Chairs and District Newsletter Chairs about publicizing this contest. Each district will be judging their own winner for their Mid Winter Conventions (who will receive a club plaque at Multiple) and then be sent in to me for judging for the Multiple winner who will win

\$500.00 for administrative funds.

Public Relations Kit

Every District in MD5M is in need of the Public Relations Kit. This is a tote that contains items that publicizes Lions.

First off, who maintains this and keeps it up to date. If you, as a Public Relations Chair are not prepared to maintain it, speak to your DG and see if there is that one Lion that might be interested in this job. If your district is large, you may want 2 and then you need 2 Lions in 2 different areas of your districts to keep it going. You need to order a District Banner, ours is 4'x 6'. If you need an example of it, let me know.

Once you get the kit compiled, you will need to get it out there for clubs to know you have this kit that they can usenewsletter is a start. 5M3's kit didn't start traveling well until after a few zone meetings where I had it displayed and it really took off after our Mid Winter Convention.

A plastic table skirt from a Party store and plastic table cloth to fit 8 foot table will dress it up. You will also need a container to fit it all into, make sure it has wheels. I purchased a large square cooler from Wal-Mart with a luggage extension handle. I also purchased from an office supply some plastic display holders for some of the brochures so everything isn't lying on the table. I used an old vase for the pencils and candy. I picked up some plastic rectangular containers with lockdown lids to put the bookmarkers (from Vision Foundation), magnets, sticky notes and eye glass wipes in.

Make sure you put a folder with your instructions on using the kit, note who they return it to, and a list of all the Lions Clubs in your District with President Contact info. Don't forget to include a supply ziplock bag with scissors, tape, string, pens, 3M hooks with refills for the hooks (to hang banner), paper clips, rubber binders, and any miscellaneous you think you need to make the kit work.

This kit needs to gone through after it is returned from each outing to make sure you have is restocked.

CLUB NEWS

Atikokan Lions

In May, several members took Spot Camera training and screened children at Northstar Community School and at the Mine Centre School. Club members participated in the annual Town-wide Clean Up on May 13th and assisted with the set up and organizing of an "Arabian Night" dinner and auction fundraising event that was held on May 27th for Syrian refugees coming to Atikokan.

On June 5th several club members partnered with the OPP to hold a Bike Rodeo and safety training event at Northstar Community School and St. Pat's School. Through the summer "tickets" were issued by the OPP to students that were following bike safety practices. The tickets were for a free hot dog and drink from the Atikokan Lions redeemable during the Atikokan Bass Classic event held in August. On June 14 Grade 1 students at both elementary schools received a lesson on Canadian Flag history and a Canadian flag for our Project Pride event. Three people from Atikokan attended the International Convention in Chicago.

In July, the CNIB eye van was in Atikokan for four days. Club members provided administrative assistance for the medical services the van provides. The Club also held its annual "wind up" dinner that includes the Eye van staff as our special guests.

August was the Atikokan Bass Classic where the Lions are one of the food service providers. This year we sold about 330 burgers, 135 hot dogs, 100 wild rice and bacon sausages, 11 cases of chicken fingers, 20 lbs of pulled pork and 19 pails of homemade french fries! We also had the draw for \$1000 worth of gas.

We will begin our regular club meeting schedule in September and next on our project list is the selling of our Community Spirit Calendar. The calendar shows birthday, anniversary and in memorial dates along with advertisements by local business.

Dryden Trillium Lions

Dryden Trillium Lions Club – #53070 - Activity Report for June, 2017

- Trillium Lions' June general meeting and wind-up was held on a beautiful summer evening at the Dryden Flying Club where we enjoyed a pot luck supper and social time prior to our meeting. We installed our 2017-18 Board of Directors and presented awards. Lion Susan Pollock received her President's Club Excellence pin for leading us to obtain Club Excellence status in 2015-16. Two members, Theresa Waites and Linda Dahmer, were awarded Silver Centennial Awards for sponsoring new members. The evening was capped off with two deserving Trillium Lions being presented with the HOPE Medal (<u>Helping Other People Everywhere</u>). The HOPE Medal is earned through the Club's financial support to the Lions Foundation of Manitoba & Northwestern Ontario. Congratulations recipients to Lion Arlene (Chum) Hammond and Lion Leslee Lappage.
- We spent \$70 to donate 24 lbs. of hamburger to the Dryden Food Bank that will feed 96 clients.
- Meals on Wheels were delivered on June 3 & 4, 2017 by 2 Lions to 16 clients.
- We hosted the Patricia Gardens Minimal Care Home's monthly birthday party on June 5 with 30 residents and 6 Lions attending. A sing-along got the party started followed by Pistachio Dessert and visiting with those attending.

- SPOT vision camera screening was carried out at Dryden Native Friendship Centre on June 15 by 2 Trillium Lions and at Aboriginal Day on June 21 by one Trillium Lion.
- A very successful Garage Sale with contribution from our 3 area clubs, Dryden, Dryden Trillium and Vermilion Bay was held June 17 following many hours of set-up the previous day. Proceeds totalled \$2,240 that are ear-marked for hosting the 2018 Mid-Winter Convention in Dryden. Eleven Trillium Lions worked a total of 44 hours.
- Five pairs of glasses were collected in June.
- Trillium Lions Club presented a \$500 bursary to a graduating student at the Dryden High School Graduation Ceremonies on June 16, 2017.

- Meals on Wheels were delivered on August 5, 26 & 27, 2017 by 5 Lions to 16 clients of the program.
- Two Lions escorted 5 senior residents of the Patricia Gardens Minimal Care Home to and from an afternoon of lunch a bingo at the Dryden Native Friendship Centre.
- The annual visit of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind (CNIB) mobile Eye Van took place on August 14 & 15, 2017. Five Trillium Lions provided reception and processing duties, working a total of 18 hours and serving 70 clients.
- The Dryden Agricultural Fall Fair was the place to be on August 24, 25 & 26, 2017 and Lions were there to serve tasty food from the Dryden Lions' Food Booth. Eleven (11) Trillium Lions assisted at the counter and prep areas as well as set-up and follow-up.
- The winner of the 2017 truck/boat/trailer Lottery, a partnership between Dryden Lions Club and Dryden Trillium Lions Club, was drawn August 29. The lucky winner of the package valued at just under \$50,000 was a resident of Ignace ON. Stay tuned for details as the project is finalized.
- Three Northern Travel Grant advances were provided to 3 applicants.

Dryden Lions



Support groups provide an opportunity to connect with others facing similar challenges. Vision loss can be isolating, especially if you do not know anyone else experiencing changes in their vision.

Jan, a member of the vision loss support group shares what meetings mean to her: "everybody needs to know that there's somebody out there just like me, blind people just like me, and you can do so much even though you're blind." Monthly support group meetings include time for people to share their story and connect as well as guided discussions, guest speakers, and information on available community services.

The Lighthouse Center for Vision Loss coordinates several support groups throughout NE Minnesota, bringing individuals together to share their stories and learn about community resources available to help them adjust to vision loss.

Increasing access to the benefits of support groups is an important part of the Lighthouse's mission of fostering independent and vibrant lives for individuals with vision loss. A new Vision Loss Support Group has recently started meeting at Keystone Bluffs Assisted Living in Duluth and another group will begin meeting in July at the Cook County Senior Center in Grand Marais. In addition to the new support groups, existing groups continue to meet regularly in Grand Rapids, Hibbing, and Duluth.

If you know someone experiencing vision loss, or who has difficulty seeing event with glasses or contacts, encourage them to check out their local support group. Visit LCFVL.org/SupportGroups for a complete listing of groups meeting in the region.

A local, independent 501c3 nonprofit, the Lighthouse has been serving the Northland for nearly 100 years. Today we provide training and other services to 1,500 individuals with vision loss each year. We serve youth, working-age adults, and seniors through services provided at the vision rehabilitation center, at home, or in the workplace. Training is available in daily living skills, orientation and mobility, technology, braille, and adaptive leisure. Other services include Low Vision Support Groups, a Low Vision Store and the Twin Ports News of the Air radio station.
