MD5M Council of Governors

The Council of Governors meeting was held at Mahnomen Shooting Star Casino on October 21, 2017. Political Liaison opened the session at 7:30 a.m. PID Lion Brian Sheehan has requested 5-10 minutes at every Mid-Winter Convention Business meeting to speak about his upcoming nomination for Lions Clubs International President in July at Las Vegas NV. If Lion Brian cannot be present at your convention, he will have a representative there. They are looking for donations of items for their Campaign Auction room at the Multiple Convention in April at Winnipeg MB. Please contact Lion Bert Nelson if you have something to donate. The Campaign Committee requested that the Official Parade Shirt at the Lions Clubs International Convention be the hockey jersey or the hockey polo shirt being used in campaign. The committee has 1000 shirts to give away to those who register to attend the convention. Be sure the check your newsletters for the registration form or go online to any of the Lions websites to obtain the registration. Remember that voting delegates are different at International than at Multiple with 1 club delegate for every 0-25 member; 2 delegates for 0-50. Any Lions Club who donates to the campaign gets a banner patch for supporting Lion Brian's campaign. These donations can be sent to your district campaign leader, Lion Bert Nelson or Lion Brian Sheehan.

Council of Governor meeting was called to order by Council Chair Dennis Heinen at 8 a.m. A new Multiple GST Chair is PDG Rodger Palmer, and a new Multiple Protocol Chair is PID Maynard Rucks. DG Dan Kaiser is petitioning the state to have special license plates for MN vehicles made with the Lions logo on it. District PDG Dan Snobl spoke on the Dental Initiative and request that we do more into each district on this quest. PCC Bill Taubman from the Wisconsin Lions Mission who takes trips to Central America to distribute eye glasses spoke on the possibility of MD5M MN starting a mission group to get the eye glasses out. Bids were made for future MD5M Multiple Conventions. These bids will be voted on at the Multiple Convention in April at Winnipeg- 2020- Rochester, May 1-3 hosted by Pine Island Lions and the Oronoco Lions; 2021- Mankato, April 30-May 2 hosted by 5M2 Lions; 2022- St. Cloud, April 29-May1 hosted by District 5M4. Other MD5M Conventions already passed are: 2018- Winnipeg MB April 13-15 and 2019- Mahnomen April 26-28. Check out the new MD5MConvention website for detail.

GMT Chair PCC Todd Neumann- MD5M has 6 new Lions Clubs formed so far this year and District 4 has overall net growth. There are 3 Districts with plus membership: Districts 1, 4, and 6. Highest retention which is -17 is District 13. Most new members is District 9 and District 7 has the highest grown of women in Lions. District GMT & the District Governors need to track their District stats. We are still the 2nd largest Multiple in the US but we are only 599 members ahead of California who is growing quickly. Remember the way to retention is by orientation. Contact your District Chair for help.

The Lake Superior run by Lion Bill Michel was started with him taking 994,997 steps in 45 days from Thunder Bay to Sault St Marie when Lion Bill developed a medical problem and had to quit. He plans on restarting his trek next spring once he has had time to heal. He is raising funds for LCIF.

Centennial Celebration will take place in June at the Anoka County Fair Grounds with events happening in every area of the Centennial Challenges. Events will run from morning until late evening so every Lion can participate. There will be a "Little Red Wagon Parade" where every club is asked to bring a decorated red wagon. Be sure to mark the date of Sunday June 10th from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. For questions contact: MD5M100years@gmailcom. Details are on the District Facebook websites.

Diabetes will now share the MN State Fair booth with the MN Lions Hearing Foundation and the MN Lions Vision Foundation. LCIF now has a 4 star rating for an organization to donate to since we give every dollar obtained to help someone. MD5M Leo's Convention will be held October 12-14, 2018 at True Friends. Cost is \$175.00 per person. Campers needed to be turned away this because they failed to pre-register and there was no room for them so be sure to register. Information is on the Leo's Facebook page. Remember the Leo's if your club has a gambling license for the LEO's are now a 501c3. The donations help reduce the cost of camps and fund various projects and events that they host. Project New Hope is searching for a "Marketing/PR person" to help promote this area. This is a paid position. If you are interested please contact PDG Dick Labraaten. The MN Hearing Foundation "Defeat Hearing Walk" is planned for Saturday, June 2, 2018 at the MN Arboretum. Mark your calendars. The next USA/Canada Forum will be held in Columbus OH, September 20-22, 2018. Friday night party is a tailgating party so wear your favorite team jersey. Cost is \$260.00 until May 31, 2018 when the price goes up. Camp Spicer (MD5M Youth Exchange) is now a 501c3 and is looking for donations from any club that has a gambling license. Awards were being presented to the 2 bands from MN who performed at the International parade in Chicago. Waconia Band was on November 7th, and East Central Band on December 7th.



Greetings to all Lions!

Can Do Canines is engaging in an ambitious new fundraising goal to double the number of dogs trained in a year. Because there is a waiting list for service dogs of almost 200 people the need far exceeds the current capacity to train about 50 dogs a year. The big hang up is the need for funds since each dog costs about \$40,000 to train. I hope that the clubs in our District will consider generously supporting this new growth initiative at the midwinter Parade of Green in Dryden. Remember each dog is provided to the recipient at no cost so fundraising is critical to the operation of Can-Do-Canines.

Graduation was just held on October 28, 2017.

Tails to Tell Tours are held monthly and are an excellent way to learn more about these incredible dogs and the numerous ways they help their clients. The next tour is set for November 18 and the following one is December 14.

An additional way to help is by raising a dog for training. Here is an excerpt explaining that process from their website:

Raising a dog is a lot like raising a child. It takes a lot of patience, time and effort before they are ready to work. Raising an assistance dog is similar in many ways.

The journey of our puppies begin when they arrive at our facility from our breeding program, <u>a donor</u> or a local animal shelter. They usually stay about a week for medical check-ups, socialization and the all-important "Super Puppy Training," led with the help of <u>volunteers</u>.

Then the little pups are off to one of two places: a volunteer puppy raiser or a prison puppy training program. **Puppy Raising**

<u>Puppy Raisers</u> are the heart and soul of Can Do Canines. Puppy Raisers transform our mission from words on paper to a priceless reality for people with disabilities.

Puppy Raisers take in a puppy for six to 18 months. They teach the puppy good house manners, basic obedience and early assistance dog skills while exposing the puppy to as many social situations as possible. Puppy Raisers attend a minimum of two training meetings each month and provide a home, food, basic veterinary care and lots of love!

Prison Puppy Program

In our <u>prison puppy program</u> (and no, we don't send only the "naughty puppies" here) our puppies receive around-the-clock attention and training from carefully-selected inmates. The pups also get "prison breaks" or furloughs. Prisons are a contained, artificial environment, so we want to ensure our dogs are also comfortable and able to perform their important skills in a different kinds of settings. <u>Foster Volunteers</u> take the pups home for a weekend or longer and expose them to all the places they'll need to eventually work in, such as restaurants, stores and movie theaters.

Final Training/Client Placement

When the puppies finally reach about 18 months of age, they make their return trek back to Can Do Canines facility for final training. They are assessed by our trainers to find out what they're best at (i.e. smelling low blood sugar, alerting to sounds) and then those skills are further refined. When the dog is deemed ready, he or she is partnered with a client and the two begin to train together to ensure they are a good match. If they are then you can join Can Do Canines and celebrate along with them at our Graduation Ceremony!

Thanks for all you can do to help Can-Do-Canines!

This is the final year of our Centennial Celebration. Just a few quick points to make for our clubs:

First, remember there are 5 service areas in the Centennial Challenge this year, Youth, Vision, Hunger, Environment and this year's addition, Diabetes. Many of our clubs are not reporting in these categories for this year. To date, 24 of our 44 clubs have not reported a single service activity. 8 clubs have only reported a single activity. Only the Bemidji Lions Club has reported projects in all 5 service categories. Congratulations! To them for their efforts. I know that Lions serve, but it only counts if your club secretary reports the activities.

Second, each club should be focused on leaving a lasting legacy in their community with a signature legacy project. If you need ideas, please contact me at bwmlaw@paulbunyan.net.

Third, we need to invite new members to join our clubs for greater impact. Our district membership is at 1,222 as I write this so we need to get to work and grow our clubs!

I want to finish by sharing some statistics at the world level:

183,570, 064 people have been served in the 5 challenge categories worldwide! That is with 35,932 clubs reporting.

541,753 Centennial Members have joined Lions clubs across the globe and we have created 4,932 Centennial Clubs.

Only 21,825 legacy projects have been reported worldwide, and only 8,867 clubs have reported on legacy projects.

Let's finish our Centennial Celebration strong with 100 per cent participation by the Lions Clubs of 5-M-10!

International Presidential Awards for Mid Winters

4th Highest Award- International President's Certificate of Appreciation- This certificate recognizes outstanding accomplishments, especially in providing full support to club presidents or District Governors in their efforts to operate and build up their respective clubs and District. They should be awarded to Lions who provide support in conducting meaningful humanitarian services or meaningful actions.

3rd Highest Award- International President's Leadership Medal- Should be considered for Lions and Leos who make significant contributions to leadership development and results within our association. Quality leadership is essential to our association in that it affects membership growth, the service that we provide and the impact that service has on our communities and on the overall quality of the Lions clubs membership experience. These are approved by the International President.

2nd Highest Award- International President's Award- Should be considered for Lions who distinguish themselves for exemplary service that significantly strengthens their community or our Association by: being personally involved in club service projects, being supportive of the programs of Lions Clubs International, being supportive of LCIF and having sponsored at least one new member. Additionally, consideration should be given for any Lion who has contributed to the retention of members and the reduction of membership losses. (The criteria may vary each year at the International Presidents discretion)

1st **Highest Award - Ambassador of Good Will Awards**: This is the highest award given by Lions Clubs International. This award is given at the discretion of the International President. They can only give up to 40 of these during their term.

There are also numerous other awards that can be given out by the President to dignitaries and at their discretion.

Lion Recognition Medal: Lions who distinguished themselves in a disaster relief effort, lifesaving endeavor, or a service activity deemed otherwise appropriate by the International President.

Humanitarian Award: Given to one individual or group for substantial humanitarian accomplishment.

Lion Medal of Honor: Awarded posthumously for extraordinary humanitarian effort.

LCIF Friend of Humanity Award: Given at the discretion of the International President or LCIF Chair.

Head of State Medal: Given at the discretion of the International President.

Medal of Distinction: Given at the discretion of the International President.

International President's Medal of Merit: Given at the discretion of the International President.



Why D-Camps?

"Why would I send my child to a camp where all the campers have type 1 diabetes? Don't they deal with diabetes enough already?"

Diabetes introduces kids to a new reality, one that often makes them feel different from their friends. For many kids, there is no one else in their school or community who has diabetes and it can be a struggle to acknowledge diabetes openly.

A diagnosis also brings with it a whole new set of skills for kids to learn: how to test their blood glucose (sugar) levels, prime a needle for injection, insert a pump site, count carbs, recognize a high or low blood sugar, and maintain a balance between food, insulin and activity.

At D-Camps however, campers get a break from being different. Camp is one of the few places where everyone just "gets it," where the world runs on "diabetes time" and nothing has to be explained. Campers will meet other children who share a personal understanding of the challenges that come from living with diabetes, and many of these relationships develop into lifelong friendships. When children leave camp, they will have gained a new level of independence in managing their diabetes and feel empowered to continue the healthy practices they learned at camp.

So, why send your child to a camp where all the campers have type 1 diabetes? Because together, we will take charge of diabetes and never let it define us. We will explore, share, learn and laugh because we're all in this together.

Ignace Lions

LIONS PROVIDE VISION SCREENING TO CHILDREN IN IGNACE

Ignace Lions, assisted by the Vermilion Bay Lions Club, provided free vision screening to pre-school and school aged children in Ignace this past week.

A total of 165 children, ranging in age from 7 months to 18 years, were screened at Ignace Nursery School, Ignace Public School and Ignace French Catholic School. The screening is totally hands-off, and the identity of the children is totally confidential.

Lions stress that vision screening does not replace a full eye examination by an optometrist or other eye care professional, but the camera does have the ability to detect "potential" eye issues. Reports are sent home to parents and, if the camera does detect a potential problem, it is recommended that the child have a full eye examination by an optometrist or other eye care professional to further investigate the issue.

Vision screening is vitally important, and we have heard stories in the past of students with vision problems having previously been diagnosed with behavioural problems when, in fact, it was their vision that was causing the problem. There is also a heart-warming story, in which, the camera was unable to scan a child's eyes. That child was, therefore, recommended for follow-up. It turned out that the child had a tumour in the back of the eye that was interfering with the camera's ability. The tumour turned out to be malignant and was removed. The impact of that screening was that it likely saved the child's life.

Once the Duluth Lions Club purchased their vision screener and began screening children throughout the Duluth School District, the benefits of this vital service to the community became evident. Early detection leads to timely referrals and professional treatment, and every child requesting a screening should be able to receive one. The school district saw the need for a screener of their own.

Understanding this need, the Duluth Centennial Leos and Girl Scout Troop #4073 initiated a special Sight Project to raise funds to purchase a vision screener for the school district.

To date, they have raised \$7,100! Lions Clubs committed \$2,100, Essentia Health Foundation \$3,500, Miller Dwan Foundation \$500 and Northland Foundation \$1,000.

Congratulations! The final monies are expected to be raised at a *Walk for Sight* at the University of Minnesota Duluth in the spring, with the help of the UMD Campus Club. Amazing!
