

Lions MD5M Hearing Foundation, Canadian Division – Hearing Committee

Update – December 2017

The Hearing Committee held their second meeting on December 1st, 2017. It is our goal to communicate regularly with Lions throughout 5M10, 5M11 and 5M13. The Hearing Committee works within the structure of the Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario. The Hearing Committee's purpose is...To support, promote, develop and foster programs for the benefit of persons experiencing hearing loss, hearing disability or a hearing impairment.

Membership on our committee for 2017-2018 is as follows:

- o 5M10 Lions Wendy Wiedenhoeft (Chair), Bill Michl (Vice Chair)
- o 5M11 Lions John Sinclair, Dennis Doerksen
- o 5M13 Lions Lloyd McCabe (Secretary\Treasurer), Shannon Dueck

An overview of our current work is as follows:

- Infant Hearing Aid Loaner Bank Project: The Hearing Committee in collaboration with the Manitoba Audiologist Working Group has provided funding to purchase 54 hearing aids that are now available at 11 sites that provide hearing aids to children throughout Manitoba. Sites include Thompson, La Pas, Selkirk, Beausejour, Steinbach, Winkler, Portage, Brandon, Dauphin and two sites in Winnipeg. The committee received and reviewed data regarding loaner hearing aid usage as follows:
 - Hearing aids were loaned to 13 individuals during July to November
 - 4 individuals received one hearing aid and 9 individuals received two hearing aids
 - Ages of recipients were: three under one year; five ages one to six and five over six years
 - Reasons for requiring the loaner hearing aid varied:
 - 4 individuals loan before first hearing aid
 - 6 individuals repairs needed on existing hearing aid
 - 3 individuals cochlear implant candidacy loan
 - Loaner hearing aids have been used at all sites within first months of program and all audiologists are very thankful for the program. To quote one audiologist, "Having had to utilize the aids from the loaner bank twice since September, I would like to stress how valuable they are. Without them, children would have to go without hearing devices for possibly weeks at a time. Many thanks extended to the Lions for their generous support."

Data re loaner hearing aid use will continue to be collected to the end of February.

Meetings took place with audiologists in Thunder Bay and Fort Frances regarding the need for implementation of the project in NW Ontario. Both audiologists concurred that a loaner hearing aid program for children is already in place in the NW Ontario district. It was felt that it will not be necessary to initiate a further program in the 5M10 district.

The project will be reviewed at our March meeting and final recommendations will be made regarding the future of the project.

- Web Site and Resources: We are in the process of updating the web site and resources with respect to the Hearing Committee. A handout is available for use at Mid-Winter Conventions.
- **Decibel Award**: The Decibel Award will be sent to clubs who have donated a cumulative total of \$500 to the Lions MD5M Hearing Foundation, Canadian Division Hearing Committee. Clubs may then honour those Lions or community members who have demonstrated significant support for people with hearing concerns.
- Support for Individuals In Need Purchasing Hearing Aids: Support has been provided to 4 individuals to purchase hearing aids so far this year. The Hearing Committee is proud to work with Lions clubs throughout our districts in assisting in the purchase of hearing aids for those in need.
- Collection of Used Hearing Aids: Used hearing aids are collected across the region and are refurbished through the Foundation for ongoing use. Used hearing aids can be collected by Lions Clubs and given to Hearing Committee Directors or delivered to the Lions Foundation of Manitoba and NW Ontario office at 320 Sherbrook St., Winnipeg.
- Parade of Green 2017-2018: Please consider supporting the Lions MD5M Hearing Foundation, Canadian Division Hearing Committee at the Parade of Green in the upcoming year to help us in fulfilling our purpose of assisting those living with hearing loss.

LITPC YOUTH SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION

Graduating Leos or sons/daughters, grandsons/granddaughters of Lions or Lioness are eligible to apply for the LITPC (Lions International Trading Pin Club) Youth Scholarship. Two (\$2,500) scholarships will be awarded. In 2012, the first recipient was a Leo from Pennsylvania. In 2013, the recipient was from Virginia. In 2014, the recipient was from Iowa. In 2015, the recipient was from Virginia. In 2016, there was 1 recipient from Georgia and 1 recipient from Minnesota. In 2017, there were 2 recipients both from New York. The 2018 recipients will be announced at the Pin Traders Annual Breakfast at the Lions International Convention in Las Vegas, Nevada in July, 2018.

Can Do Canines

Jennifer Brisson and Diabetes Assist Dog Apollo

Jennifer Brisson of St. Louis Park, Minnesota is an active mother of two. While she and husband, Samuel, enjoy being outdoors and spending time with the kids, Jennifer has an added challenge in her life. At age 25, she was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes. Although she wears an insulin pump to help regulate her blood sugar levels, she developed hypoglycemia unawareness—which means that she no longer feels symptoms when her blood sugars dropped to dangerously low levels. Worried that she might have an emergency while home alone with two small children, Jennifer knew she needed some other kind of help.

Jennifer was matched with Apollo, a handsome Smooth Coat Collie who was raised at Sandstone prison. One of his inmate-trainers there wrote, "I still can't believe I have a dog in my cell. Every day it just keeps getting cooler and cooler. I will be able to put this experience on my list of accomplishments to help me be successful when I leave. I believe this was brought into my life for a reason."

About three weeks after Apollo arrived, Jennifer says, she realized what having him in her life means. "We were going for a walk with a neighbor. I was ready to go, the kids were set and we were about to head out the door. Apollo stood in front of me and refused to move," she recalls. "I insisted, again he refused. I thought, 'I'd better check my blood sugar.' Sure enough it was low. I hadn't felt the symptoms, but if I had gone out I probably would've gotten into trouble."

Can Do Canines

Gabe O'Donnell and Autism Assist Dog Ramsey

Since Gabe O'Donnell was little, his mother, Rebecca had been scouring the internet looking for different kinds of treatment for kids with autism. She came across videos of children with autism interacting with assistance dogs and saw what a huge difference it made with their behaviors. She said, "We thought it was probably something that could benefit Gabe in a lot of ways and turns out it did!"

Ramsey is a two-and-a-half year old Black Labrador Retriever who was specifically trained at Faribault Prison as an Autism Assist Dog. Ramsey helps Gabe with multiple aspects of his disability. While in public, Gabe wears a specially designed belt that connects to Ramsey's pack, and his parents then handle Ramsey's leash. If Gabe attempts to run (a common behavior for children with autism) or has a meltdown due to sensory overload, Ramsey will be a gentle, steady anchor that keeps Gabe safe until his parents can control the stressful situation. Ramsey also acts as a social buffer because his presence encourages Gabe to interact with other people and practice his verbal skills.

When Gabe starts to become upset, he will initiate a "visit" behavior from Ramsey, which means that Ramsey will come and rest his head on Gabe's lap. This light pressure helps him focus on the dog, preventing or suppressing meltdowns. Ramsey will also lay in bed with Gabe which helps him stay in his bed during the night. Gabe's parents say, "Ramsey has made a difference in our lives. Everything about Gabe has changed. Having a dog that's so driven to him has changed his attitude about a lot of things."

Lisa Peterson and Seizure Assist Dog Morrie

Lisa has struggled with a seizure disorder (PNES) for more than 10 years. The situation became even more concerning two years ago, when Lisa lost the "aura" that had previously helped alert her to an impending episode. That meant that seizures would now come without warning, sometimes in precarious places, like in the shower or on the stairs, and render her confused afterwards.

Lisa's husband, Jim, and their kids were hesitant about welcoming an assistance dog into their home. But when they saw what Morrie could do—how he bonded with Lisa, how he helped Lisa avert emergencies, how he gave them all peace of mind—they fell in love. Now Morrie is a bona fide family member, always ready to work but still ready to play.

Morrie has amazed others as well. At a recent salon appointment, Morrie was resting next to Lisa's chair. Suddenly he jumped up from a deep sleep and began nudging and pawing at Lisa. The stylist quickly helped them to a quiet area, and Morrie lay down next to Lisa where he remained for the duration of the seizure (about three-four minutes). When it was over, Lisa heard cheering and clapping. It was only then that she—and Morrie—realized that they were in view of salon staff and patrons.

Morrie received training at three of our prison programs, including Duluth, Waseca and Sandstone. Now, he pre-alerts Lisa to each of her seizures, and stays with her until he is sure that they are done. He gives her independence, and brings her family peace of mind.

Vonna DeLong and Hearing Assist Dog Bonnie

Vonna's history with assistance dogs is impressive. Her need for them arose when she lost her hearing in adulthood following a bout with scarlet fever in her teen years. Her hearing declined steadily until she realized the need for hearing aids and then decided that an assistance dog became a priority.

Vonna received her first Hearing Assist Dog, Cody, from Can Do Canines in 1994. He was a 110-pound German Shepherd that she had for 14 years. Her second Hearing Assist Dog, Lady, was also larger than 50 pounds. So when the idea of a tiny 9-pound Bonnie came around, Vonna was a tad uncertain.

Bonnie is a lovely Pomeranian/Papillion mix Hearing Assist Dog. Her keen alert skills, that she picked up training at Faribault Prison, are giving Vonna and her family great peace of mind, keeping her safe when alone.

Vonna tells us, "I thought I needed a bigger dog but I found out very quickly I didn't. This one's the right size." When asked about Bonnie's performance as a Hearing Assist Dog, Vonna is very complimentary. "I didn't expect a small dog to be this intelligent. She doesn't miss anything and is a great alerter to strange sounds in the house."

Braxton Wiebusch and Mobility Assist Dog Blue

Braxton Wiebusch from Sartell, Minnesota enjoys hunting, fishing, camping and competing in wheelchair hockey. He's a 20-year-old college student with Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy, a degenerative muscle disease that affects every muscle in his body. Braxton and his family wanted an assistance dog, but they were uncertain about this decision because of the fur allergies they collectively deal with.

Enter the playful and sweet canine, Blue. Blue is a handsome two-and-a-half-year-old Poodle who sports a white and brown coat. Not only was Blue specially trained at the training program in Duluth Prison as a Mobility Assist Dog, but he rarely sheds due to having hair instead of fur. Blue was a perfect fit for Braxton and the Wiebusch family. Blue loves helping Braxton with things like opening and closing doors, picking things up from off the ground like his keys or the remote, and providing comfort to Braxton while staying in his room at night.

Braxton found out about Can Do Canines while he was attending the Muscular Dystrophy Association Summer Camp. Braxton was on the waiting list for two years until Blue was ready to train and begin the bonding process. Braxton noted, "Being on the waitlist for a Poodle was well worth the wait. While they can be a little more challenging to train than a lab, they're very smart animals and are completely worth it!"
