Leader Dog for the Blind

Leader Dog for the Blind's mission is to empower people who are blind or visually impaired with lifelong skills for safe and independent daily travel.

The US statistics are startling:

- 1) 1.3M people are blind or visually impaired.
- 2) 75,000 people become visually impaired or blind each year.
- 3) 90 percent of blind or visually impaired people are in low income settings.
- 4) Only 10% travel independently with a white cane or guide dog.
- 5) Due to travel restrictions, a startling 60% of working age adults who are blind are unemployed.

Leader Dog helps thousands of people who are blind, visually impaired or Deaf/Blind and in critical need of developing the skills required to travel safely and independently. Their services have a positive impact on our client's confidence, health, employment opportunities, families, and communities. Because Leader Dog believes that every person deserves equal opportunity, all programs are provided at no costs. Leader Dog is 100% funded through philanthropy and donations without federal, state, or business support.

The cost of matching a Leader Dog with a client costs \$41,000.

A client will spend 25 days on the Leader Dog campus getting "trained" to work with the Leader Dog.

The average working years of a Leader Dog is 8-9 years.

The ages of the clients vary from 16-78 years old. Summer Experience Camp is a unique summer camp for 16-17 year olds who are legally blind, combining fun and leadership activities with an introduction to guide dogs.

Lions contribute \$14M annually to Leader Dog for the Blind.

There are 11 voice commands taught during the training. "Park" or "Forward" are examples.

In every Leader Dog lies the heart of a Lion.

USA/Canada Forum Leadership Report

5M10 FVDG Wayne Tieman

September 20-21-22, 2018

Lion Lenay and I traveled to Columbus, Ohio for our first ever Forum. Besides our attendance at the Forum, we visited friends along the way in Truman, MN and Escanaba, MI; the Grotto of Redemption in Iowa; the Lew Wallace Historical site in Crawfordsville, IN; the Ark Encounter and Creation Museum in Kentucky; and the Gerald Ford Presidential Museum in Grand Rapids, MI. We saw the start of the fall colors, especially in the UP of Michigan. We traveled through 8 states, drove 2600 miles, and we were gone from Bemidji for 10 days. Even with all the learning and excitement, it was good to get home!

The USA/Canada Forum was one of our best Lions experiences ever. We were so pleased with the event, and we have signed up for the next Forum in Spokane, Washington, next September. The theme throughout the Forum was "Building Teams through Leadership". The keynote speakers and seminars provided instruction and review on how club leaders can learn to grow and manage the Lions club and how Lion leaders can hone and advance leadership skills.

There were 2000 Lions in attendance for the forum.

The Lions heard from 4 amazing inspirational speakers at the Forum:

- 1) John Pinero, as legendary coach Vince Lombardi, who spoke (and acted) on Vince's keys to success.
- 2) Michelle Ray, who spoke on how to take the lead, to embrace change, and to own your future.
- 3) Lions International President Gudrun Yngvadottir, the first female international president, spoke on change going into LCI's second century.
- 4) Jon Petz, a magician and motivational speaker, focused on building foundations and breaking through barriers. Leaders do not have the luxury of "just showing up".

- 1) "Public Speaking: No More Nerves"
- 2) "The Referee Called a Foul on the Crowd"
- 3) The Power of Storytelling
- 4) Lions Pride
- 5) Your Club, Your Way

On Wednesday, September 12th Duluth Lions presented an ARM-LOC rescue kit to Duluth Police Chief Mike Tusken.



Connie Sylvester of Water Rescue Innovations, Inc. was present along with Lions Bob Howe, Tom Sailstad, Tom O'Brien, and photographer, Lion Jamie Rabold.

Chief Tusken discussed how he would like to see an ARM-LOC in each of the 66 squad cars patrolling the streets of Duluth, indicating that in many cases the Duluth Police are the first on the scene of an emergency.



We hope to use some of the proceeds from this year's Apple Harvest to purchase additional ARM-LOCs for donation.



ARM-LOC is an easy to use, life saving device that will give police, fire and rescue responders an extra arm in saving people trapped by various water disasters. It can be used for floods, hurricanes and tsunamis as well as ice and rapid water rescues and snowmobile and boating accidents.

The ARM-LOC slides onto the victim's forearm and the rescue responder or the victim pulls the yellow lanyard that deploys and locks the device into place, eliminating the need for the victim to grasp a rope. It can be deployed in seconds and re-deployed over and over again.
